# Summary of the Book of Proverbs

## Introduction

## Group Bible Study: Proverbs Chapters 1–9

Each session includes a brief summary, focus points, discussion questions, and activities for practical application.

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### Session 1: The Beginning of Wisdom (Proverbs 1)
